Division Spotlight: CoA One Stop Student Success

The Challenge

Marcel had been unemployed for over a decade, being challenged by several barriers to employment.

The Solution

What did the One Stop/AJCC provide to help overcome the challenge(s)?

Marcel came into the program after being out of work for well over a decade. He enrolled into the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) services at the Alameda One Stop. Marcel then diligently attended all workshops, followed all of the recommendations given to him, came in for several individual Case Management appointments, where he received vocational counseling, assessment, and additional individualized supports. He spent time working with staff to carefully develop a resume. Prior to a job fair, Marcel also spent significant amounts of time practicing his interview skills one-on-one with his Case Manager, Nia Ford.

Placement Assessment Update

Starting December 1st, COA students will be assessed for English, Math, and ESL with 4 four new placement instruments.

As the primary method, students who have graduated high school within the last 10 years and have a copy of their high school transcript will be placed via Multiple Measures Assessment Project (MMAP). The MMAP model uses student high school transcript data to provide a more complete picture of student ability. Statewide, the MMAP initiative has provided a way to increase the accuracy of placement--especially in areas related to reducing under placement.

In addition to MMAP placement, due to the statewide delay in implementing the Common Assessment Initiative and the sun setting of the ACT COMPASS test, the PCCD Colleges will be using the following instruments:

- English
CTEP (College Test of English Proficiency)
- Math
MDTP (California Mathematics Diagnostic Testing Project)
- ESL
CELSA (Combined English Language Skills Assessment)
AND
ESL Writing Sample

COA students will sign up for a MMAP Session OR traditional testing (via CTEP and MDTP) in the Assessment Department. The easiest way for students to sign up for testing is online using the esars Appointment System: <http://alameda.peralta.edu/assessment/>

COA and the other PCCD colleges will continue to use COMPASS until November 30th.



Health Services Highlight

This semester health services has visited over 30 classrooms, held a successful blood drive, and provided workshops on healthy eating and stress management. Beginning November 1st we will have an open enrollment specialist who can assist people in enrolling with covered California and Medi-Cal every Tuesday from 11:30 to 2:30 in the F-building.

The Outcome

What was the actual result obtained as a result of the services received?

Marcel got a job at Oakmont of Mariner Point, a long term business partner of the College of Alameda One Stop; Oakmont operates an Assisted Living facility right on the local waterfront. They attended a Job Fair at College of Alameda, where they met Marcel, and were significantly impressed with his skills and demeanor. He applied and was granted an interview right at the job fair; soon after he was hired to perform tasks as a provider at the Assisted Living facility.

Marcel did not end his career pathway there; he kept coming back to the One Stop for job retention services, looking for career advancement opportunity. His Case Manager then referred him to another job fair hosted at the College of Alameda, and AEC Living hired him right on the spot! Marcel still sets his sights on further advancement, but in the meantime has requested, negotiated and received a well-deserved raise. Marcel is a testimony to the importance of following through and diligent work.

Fall 2016 BOGG Fee Waiver Update

The Board of Governors (BOG) Fee Waiver is available for eligible students who are attending California community colleges by waiving students' per unit fee. The intent of the waiver is to assist students who want to move into a career pathway or transfer to a four-year university.

As of this Fall 2016 term, when the students qualify for the BOG Fee Waiver, they are required to meet the academic and progress standards in order to avoid losing their BOG Fee Waiver.

Students may lose their fee waiver eligibility:

- Academic -- Cumulative GPA falls below 2.0 for two consecutive primary terms (Fall/Spring).
- Progress -- Cumulative number of units complete is not more than 50% for two primary terms (Fall/Spring).
- Combination of Academic and Progress -- Any combination of two consecutive primary terms (Fall/Spring) of cumulative GPA falls below 2.0 and/or cumulative number of units complete is not more than 50%.

There are three ways that the students can have their BOG Fee Waiver reinstated:

- Improved GPA and/or course completion to meet academic and progress standards.
- Successful approved for BOGW Petition
- Not attending PCCD colleges for two consecutive primary terms (fall/spring)

BOGW Petition process:

- *Step 1:* Students on BOG dismissal will need to create an account on Financial Aid TV (FATV) GetSAP where they will be required to view a series of informational videos. They will be tested on the content and will need to receive an overall passing rate of 80% in order to receive a certificate. These certificates will need to be printed as verification of passing. If students do not pass they will be allowed to retake the test.
- *Step 2:* Students will be required to show a copy of the printed certificate to the financial aid staff in order to receive a BOGW Petition form. (Note: The certificate needs to be submitted along with the BOGW Petition package).
- *Step 3:* Students must make an appointment to see a counselor to develop a Student Education Plan (SEP).
- *Step 4:* Students submit the BOGW Petition package along with the SEP and FATV GetSAP certificate to the Financial Aid Office.
- *Step 5:* The BOG Petition Committee will make a determination and notify the students of their status update via e-mail and letter.
